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About us

The REACH for Nepal Foundation (RFN) Australia was established in the wake of the 2015 earthquakes and initially focused on the rebuilding work that was desperately needed to enable continued education and access to water.

Witnessing first-hand the need for humanitarian aid and broader development projects, the foundation increased its scope of assistance, and from 2018, projects were identified and prioritised in the context of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals.

RFN Australia's in-country advisory and delivery organisation, RFN Nepal has been predominantly focusing on providing aid in the southwest region of Nepal, Gandaki Province.

Requests for assistance come from different villages and regions in the province through the chairman of the villages or from women's groups, and RFN Nepal determines the relative priorities of the projects through consultation with the leaders of the villages and through an advisory group.

The key focus of our work is to assist the most vulnerable and marginalised.

RFN Australia is run entirely by volunteers with all funds donated to the foundation directed to those in most need in the Gandaki Province.

Our Purpose

The purpose and work of the foundation is directly linked and guided by the organisation's objectives, vision and philosophy.

Our Objectives

The objectives of the foundation are encapsulated in the acronym of the name of the organisation – Rebuild, Educate, Assist, Children/Communities (giving) Hope for Nepal.

Our Vision

Our vision is to improve the lives of Nepalese people through projects that enable villages to become more self-sustaining and provide children opportunities for quality education, good health and values. This will not only benefit them now, but also provide them the opportunity as future leaders to improve the livelihood of coming generations.

Our Philosophy

At the highest level, **our philosophy** is that every life is precious, which translates into the importance to help anyone in genuine need of aid in the Gandaki province in Nepal.

RFN has universal values and principles and has no affiliation with any single political or religious system.

We are committed to the values of the Australian Council for International Development (ACFID):

- Integrity We act with honesty and are guided by ethical and moral principles in all that we do.
- Accountability We take
 responsibility for our actions and are
 accountable to all our stakeholders,
 and in particular primary stakeholders,
 for our performance and integrity.

- Respect We recognise the value and diversity of every person and are committed to treating others with due regard for their rights, dignity and integrity.
- Effectiveness We strive to deliver outcomes that bring about positive change in the lives of people living in poverty.
- Equity We are committed to overcoming prejudices and disadvantage and promoting fair and just access to resources and opportunities.
- Poverty We work with and alongside others in a spirit of mutuality, respecting diversity and difference in the pursuit of common goals.



We value the **UN Sustainable Development Goals** and use these to determine the relative priority of projects.



The primary focus of any projects will be to not only to build or restore capacity but also to build capability and enhance sustainability in the Nepalese community receiving assistance.



Our planning is based on the organisation's strategy, objectives, vision and values. Our Project Briefs and Evaluation Reports correlate the extent to which the project outcomes contribute to this end.



Chairman's Report

I am pleased to once again to have the opportunity to report to our partners and supporters on the work of the REACH for Nepal Foundation for the 2023 – 24 financial year.

The year was characterised with over 50 people travelling with the Foundation to deliver both infrastructure and humanitarian aid projects. This was a wonderful response after the years when we couldn't travel due to Covid restrictions. Apart from our continued investment in building earthquake resilient classrooms, a leading architectural firm – COX Architecture, partnered with us to develop a design template for the build of earthquake resilient health clinics in remote areas of Nepal.

One of the highlights of the year was a large contingent of 24 students and staff from Canberra Grammar School completing a program of work which began in 2018. Key infrastructure was delivered in 2023 to protect the investment of multiple classroom builds as well as increased hygiene facilities and a water filteration system.





In addition, community groups from Hervey Bay and Melbourne raised funds and partnered with the Foundation to deliver valuable projects close to their hearts. In total, over 350 individuals in remote western Nepal directly benefitted from the work of the foundation during the past financial year.

Critical to the success of the work of the Foundation is the delivery team in Nepal led by Lachhu Thapa. The team's organisational and delivery skills, often in challenging circumstances, cannot be overstated.

On behalf of the Board and volunteer staff, I offer gratitude to every person and every organisation, large and small, that has joined in some way with the Foundation to create positive, meaningful and sustainable change. This Annual Report tells some of the story of your impact.

Our Programs

Infrastructure Build

The second type of project is infrastructure projects which generally take the form of rebuilding classrooms that are unsafe or leaking water in times of rain. Typically, when we deliver an infrastructure project, we also provide access to water and install a water filtration system to ensure the water is safe to drink.

Village Sustainability Projects

Finally, we undertake village sustainability projects that provide opportunities for those most vulnerable in the villages. These projects provide goats (and shelters for the goats) to families who are least able to put food on the table or send their children to school. These families are then able to generate an income through breeding the goats which in turn helps the family to survive and afford education for their children.

Education is a key factor to reduce or eliminate poverty, and we prioritise the allocation of goats to families with daughters as they are typically first to stay at home and help out.

Humanitarian Aid

The first type of project is humanitarian aid which is typically in the form of emergency relief in times of flooding, earthquakes and pandemics as we experienced over the last three years. This is normally in the form of medical assistance, livelihood support packages and food supplies.

Education on Health and Hygiene

Thirdly, we undertake projects that educate mothers groups and school children the basics about hygiene and nutrition.

Our Projects

Some of the projects undertaken during this reporting period -



Infrastructure Build

RFN continued to work on the Foundation's original focus area, that being to rebuild infrastructure in remote communities. The work that the Foundation carries out in remote communities is critical as it ensures children continue to access education in a safe environment.

In 2023–24, RFN Nepal, in collaboration with Engineers and Architects from Australia, constructed award-winning earthquake-resistant classrooms. These classrooms, built with steel construction frames, are not only safer but are also designed to last significantly longer. Additionally, their larger size improves the overall learning experience for the students.

Key accomplishments during this period include:

- Volunteers from Hervey Bay, led by Lars and Carla, constructed double classrooms at Janasiddha Basic School in Harpan Village.
- Canberra Grammar School contributed to key infrastructure projects at Shree Kalika School, Banethok, including the renovation of the water tank, installation of hand basins, and construction of a retaining wall at the School.
- Sponsored by More Than Mortgages, a new roof was installed in a classroom at Shree JanaKalyan Basic School in Astam, ensuring a safer learning environment.
- The amenities block at Shree Sishukalyan Janapriya Basic School was successfully completed, thanks to the generous support of Sarah Johnston and her team from NSW. This project has greatly improved hygiene and sanitation facilities for the students.



Village Sustainability Project

RFN's Village Sustainability Project aims to support the most vulnerable families in rural communities by creating opportunities for them to generate a stable income. These projects empower families to break the cycle of poverty, with improved access to education and better livelihoods.

In 2023–24, four families in Baraha Danda received goat sheds and goats, while another four families in Taksar were provided with goats. The initiative is designed to pave the way for small–scale family businesses. Over time, the goats' yield will not only improve family nutrition but also provide a sustainable income, enabling families to access healthcare and send their children to school.

Humanitarian Aid

RFN remains committed to investing in schools and communities, addressing critical needs where help is most required. In 2023–24, RFN ran a Women's Health and Hygiene Project in the villages of Taksar and Astam, where participants were educated on personal and general hygiene practices.

At Sishukalyan Janapriya School, each student received a school uniform, shoes, stationery pack, and winter clothing. This initiative serves as an incentive for children to attend school, particularly in cases where families are unable to afford even a single set of uniforms each year. In many of the schools we work with, students often attend without uniforms or warm jackets, even on cold winter mornings.
